⁵ Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we^[a] have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access^[b] to this grace in which we stand; and we^[c] boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. ³ And not only that, but we^[d] also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, ⁴ and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, ⁵ and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us.

Sermon: "How to Handle Troubles" Rev. Dr. David Highfield

The man hadn't been feeling well so he went to a doctor to get a complete checkup. <u>"I'm afraid have some bad news,"</u> said the doctor. <u>"You're dying and you don't have much time left."</u>

"That's terrible," said the man. "How long have I got?"

"Ten" the doctor said.

"Ten, Doc?" The man asked. "Ten what?" Ten years, ten months, ten weeks?

The doctor looked at his watch, shook his head and said, <u>"Ten, nine, eight, seven...."</u> Troubles.

It appears that James is writing to Christians who have been persecuted and who have scattered throughout the world. Many of these believers were probably young in their faith. The letter was written probably in about 61 or 62 A.D. Jesus is only mentioned twice by name in the letter from James who identifies himself as "a servant of God and of our Lord Jesus Christ." His letter is a call to live a life rooted in God. This is teaching directed to the church community, especially to those acquainted with troubles.

Life is full of troubles, the ups and downs of living. Murphy's Law says it all:

- Nothing is as easy as it looks;
- Everything takes longer than you think;
- If anything can go wrong it will.
- The chance of the bread falling with the peanut butter-and-jelly side down is directly
 proportional to the cost of the carpet.
- Any tool dropped while repairing a car will roll underneath to the exact center. OR
- Switching to a shorter checkout line at the store means a longer wait.

The troubles of life are like that. They often come with no warning. Life's troubles just show up. Clearly Jesus faced troubles including his encounters with the stubborn, with opponents, with sleeping disciples, and with his arrest, trial and crucifixion. By his teachings, like the Beatitudes, he tried to prepare his disciples for the troubles to come. Some were able to handle them. Some were not able.

How are we to handle our troubles?

1. Be glad when you face troubles. (James 1: 2)

How should we respond to troubles? James first says <u>"Think of various troubles you encounter as occasions for joy"</u>, When troubles come, instead of getting mad, get joyful because you know that God can use your trouble to produce something good in your life.

- **A.** Some troubles come through our own actions with consequences. Drinking and driving is an example.
- **B**. Some are Spiritual troubles that come because we are walking with God. (persecution; others make fun.) Or maybe troubles come because we are not walking with God.
- **C**. Then there are mysterious troubles we don't understand the reason. (illness)

This verse does not mean you have to pretend the TROUBLE is fun. Rather God can use our TROUBLE to produce new growth in our walk with God. We may become better Christians. When trouble comes, you might say, "God, I know You're at work here and I know you didn't send my troubles. I know troubles are a part of human life, even for Christians. But rather than complaining, I'm going to be joyful for what You are going to accomplish in me through this difficult time."

A letter to a pastor came from a man who had lost his job. Though he faced discouragement and uncertainty, he refused to give in to despair. In his letter he wrote, "I feel as low as ever in my life, but I know this is not the final word. Because I believe God has work that God wants me to do, I rejoice and rely upon God's guidance!"

This man had discovered the key to personal strength - the faith that God will work through every event in our lives. Such faith inspired Paul to exclaim, "We rejoice in our sufferings." (Romans 5:3) Don't let bitterness spring up and spoil your walk with Christ.

2. Keep up your faith and endure. (James 1:3-4)

God doesn't send TROUBLES. They come to the good and bad alike. They are a part of living. God, in God's wisdom, and as a part of creation and human freedom, allows the TROUBLES to happen. Often these TROUBLES will test our faith.

You and I have known faithful followers of Jesus who were troubled by family or marriage troubles, economic problems, Pandemic struggles. Some congregations are troubled by lack of member involvement, lack of finances, and lack of a vision for the future.

Sometimes with those troubles come grief, anger, and mistrust. Other people are seeing us go through TROUBLES, and watching how we conduct ourselves, whether we can keep our focus on our faith, whether we can forgive, whether we can endure as the Body of Christ.

TROUBLES can take us either way. We have all known Christian people who, having lost a job, or who are overwhelmed by a wayward child, or who are being beaten down by an addiction, become bitter, isolated, God-hating people. Others have gone through similar TROUBLES and go out and start organizations to heal addicts, retrain workers, or to teach parents Biblical guidelines for raising children. They become stronger. They endure.

3. When you face troubles, pray for wisdom (James 1:5)

How are we to handle troubles? James urges us to ask for God's help. It is God's wisdom that will help us handle the TROUBLES. James suggests that we are to ask in faith and not doubt. You might pray "Lord make sense of this for me. Help me to learn from this trouble and to see how you can use the trouble to teach me and make me a better Christian. Show me how to respond to get the most out of what You want for me right now. God, I need wisdom."

Mature Christians who are experienced in dealing with TROUBLES and who have experienced the joy and endurance, know to keep asking God for more wisdom to handle present TROUBLES and those yet to come. They have learned to

Count your blessings instead of your crosses;
Count your gains instead of your losses.
Count your joys instead of your woes;
Count your friends instead of your foes.
Count your smiles instead of your tears;
Count your courage instead of your fears.
Count your full years instead of your lean;
Count your kind deeds instead of your mean.
Count your health instead of your wealth;
Count on God instead of yourself.

TROUBLES, according to James, do not indicate that God has abandoned those who know and love God. Rather, when TROUBLES come, they may test the depth of our faith and trust in God. TROUBLES remind us that we depend on God. I believe the message of James in

these verses is to have a single-hearted devotion to God, even when TROUBLES come our way. Or look again at Romans 5:3 that says troubles produce endurance, character, and hope. Says the Psalmist in 121, "Where will I find help? It will come from the Lord..."

FOUR GUYS DECIDED to go mountain climbing one weekend. In the middle of the climb, one fella slipped over a cliff, dropped about sixty feet and landed with a thud on the ledge below.

The other three, hoping to rescue him, yelled, "Joe, are you OK?"

"I'm alive ... but I think I broke both my arms!"

"We'll toss a rope down to you and pull you up. Just lie still!" said the three. "Fine," answered Joe.

A couple of minutes after dropping one end of the rope, they started tugging and grunting together, working feverishly to pull their wounded companion to safety. When they had him about three-fourths of the way up, they suddenly remembered he said he had broken BOTH his arms.

"Joe! If you broke both your arms, how in the world are you hanging on?" Joe responded, "With my TEEEEEEEEEEETH...."

Maybe there is someone watching this morning who is just barely hanging on. The TROUBLES of life seem overwhelming and you're ready to toss faith, God, and even the church out of your life. But you've come to virtual worship one more time, hoping for some answers, trying to hang on.

The letter of James can encourage you **first** to be glad in your TROUBLES because God will use them to help produce a better you. **Second**, keep enduring. Have faith. **Third**, pray for wisdom. Above all, ask Jesus to walk with you.
